An email was sent to all active members with an email address listed in their membership record on January 31 asking for a volunteer.


Joe had enough volunteers by February 4 that he requested that a second email be sent informing members that his goal of an assistant webmaster had been fulfilled

Related to the plea for help from Joe, the PCA received an anonymous donation of \$200 from a member, in addition to that their employer matched that donation dollar for dollar. The Executive Committee voted to use the money donated by the member to update and add photos as well as add additional information to the PCA website. We can only do this if someone will step forward and become the Assistant Webmaster.

We also received a second anonymous donation. It was an "in kind" donation of nearly \$100 in unused postage stamps, prepaid postal cards, prepaid envelopes. Don't be surprised if you receive an "old" envelope or an envelope with "old" postage stamps on it.

#### **Old business:**

#### 10th anniversary piece

Secretary Niehaus reported that he has shipped all ordered barns.

#### **Unconfirmed Variations section on website**

Secretary Niehaus reported that the Unconfirmed Variations section is now an option on the website but that it is not populated with any photos and the information required to confirm a piece at this time.

A motion was made, seconded, and unanimously approved to add the dark green roof with white wall barn to the section with a request for a photo of a label reading, "Dark Green/White, Dk Grn/White, or any other wording specifically noting the color combination no later than February 15.

#### PayPal

Secretary Niehaus reported that a PayPal account has been set up but due to scheduling issues with the web developer a button to pay dues was not available for the 2012 dues renewal period.

A motion was made, seconded, and unanimously approved that a button or buttons to pay dues be added to the website by no later than February 28.

### Commonwealth Plastics addition to Other Manufacturers section of website

A motion was made, seconded, and unanimously approved to add Commonwealth Plastics to the Miscellaneous > Other Manufacturers section of the PCA website.

An additional motion was made, seconded, and unanimously approved to include photos of all known colors of the lamp posts with mailboxes to that new section no later than February 28.

#### Register.com banner on new plasticville.org website

Joe Kutza reported that he and the web developer are working towards a solution to remove the banner.

#### Advertising in O Gauge Railroading magazine

Secretary Niehaus reported that he has worked a no cost advertising trade with O Gauge Railroading magazine.

The PCA will have a one sixth ad in all of the 2012 editions of O Gauge Railroading magazine in exchange for running a full page O Gauge Railroading ad in *The Villager* for all of 2012.

#### Membership application revision

A motion was made, seconded, and unanimously approved to rescind the decision to revise the current membership application to allow an applicant to remit up to three years dues with their application. The application will retain the current one year options.

#### Gift to the Secretary

A motion was made, seconded, and approved, with Secretary Niehaus abstaining, to give Secretary Niehaus a \$200 gift card in appreciation for his twelve years of service to the Association.

#### **New Business:**

#### Anonymous cash donation

Secretary Niehaus reported that he has received an anonymous donation of \$200.

He also reported that he received a matching amount from the donor's employer.

A motion was made, seconded, and unanimously approved to earmark one half of the total donation for adding additional photos to the PCA website.

#### **Unused postage donation**

Secretary Niehaus reported that he has received an anonymous donation of nearly \$90 in older, unused postage stamps, postpaid envelopes and postal cards.

#### Loss of advertisers

Secretary Niehaus reported that there has been a loss of advertisers this year constituting a 20% loss in advertising revenues. He stated that the reason given by most advertisers for not renewing was that their ads in the newsletter had not generated any business.

The meeting was adjourned at 7:35 PM, Eastern Time


with many other files! I hope to have my computer up and totally functional so that I you will see an article from me in the May issue of The Villager.



## Creative Use of Damaged Parts

Rap\$callion Bank



As our readers know, my supply of used and abused parts was practically depleted. I completed one of my past projects by resorting to using egg crate covers and salvaged shards of Plasticville. However, recently I received a quantity of reinforcements for my parts box. Among the parts was the front fascia of the Hospital plus the back and sidewalls of the Bank. Looking over those pieces it seemed they could reasonably be combined into a bank model. Join me as I describe the steps to create what will become the first branch office of *Rap\$callion Bank* 







I do not have a permanent train layout. My future hope is to build an O Scale layout that will have a medium sized city called Metropolis. The denizens of Metropolis would need a bank to provide financial services. To address that need the *Rap\$callion Bank* (left) was constructed by combining two Plasticville Banks into a large bank building, the *Rap\$callion Bank* headquarters.

Eventually Metropolis will expand and one bank may not be adequate to address customers' needs. Competing banks could satisfy customers' needs.

However, in Metropolis only *Rap\$callion Bank* is allowed! So the Directors of the bank decided to build their first branch office.

The preliminary plan for the branch would use the four pieces previously mentioned. The photo at the right shows the four wall parts laid out in a preliminary scheme for the design. It's obvious the Hospital fascia is wider than the Bank rear wall.

To keep the walls straight there were two solutions. Make the rear wall wider or trim down the front fascia. Trimming down the front fascia seemed to be the more attractive alternative. The center portion of the fascia was trimmed away from its sides. Then the windows were separated from their sides. The parts were then rearranged in another scheme.

The photo at right shows the side windows rearranged vertically. Similarly to the fascia of the main office. The bottom pieces from the Hospital match the large block design on the Bank's walls. The green pieces are leftovers from the previous bank project.

So the upper portion of the fascia wall matches the upper portion of the sides.

There is still a lot of cutting and filing to be done. The interior of this bank will also be detailed.

My next article will report on the progress of construction. Till next time: Eddie J

### Plasticville on the Boards The Appeal of Plasticville

Younger people entering our hobby sometimes wonder about the appeal of traditional Plasticville. They are used to model buildings which are highly realistic, to scale, already built-up, and supplied with ready-to-hook-up lights and other amenities.



Compared to these more recent structures, vintage Plasticville buildings tend to be unrealistic, toy-like, and not really to scale. (See Photo One.) They come with no lights and have to be assembled by hand. After years of wear, their interlocking walls don't always stay together well. And the use of glue is considered a mortal sin by many collectors.

Why, then, are so many of us drawn to these out-of-date houses, churches, and commercial buildings?



One answer has to be nostalgia. My father started buying Plasticville for our Christmas train layout almost as soon as Bachmann started producing it in the early 1950's. I honestly cannot recall a holiday season without at least a few of those buildings making an appearance. (See Photo Two.)

I still have all of them today. Among my collection are many items I've owned continuously for over fifty years. On my train table right now, I still see the same log cabin, brown-roofed Cape Cod, and green-roofed suburban station with matching freight platform that I had as a kid. Many more "originals" are boxed under the table, awaiting their turn to be cycled in and out of the community.

Size itself is another factor. The fact that PV structures are usually smaller than 0 scale, for instance, means more of them can be set up in a limited space. That was important in the small house in which I grew up back in Brooklyn, and it's still significant in the small room I have for my train layout here in Indiana. I do use some larger buildings today,



but if I were restricted to only that size my plastic village would be much less populated than it is.

Flexibility plays a role here as well. I like the fact that vintage Plasticville items are not built-up, because it makes for much easier storage. If I want to temporarily replace a police station with a fire house, for instance, I can dismantle the former, store it in a small box, and set up the latter




(which has the same footprint) with a minimal disruption to the rest of the town. (See Photo Three.) Small boxes also take up much less room under

the train table than the monstrous ones (complete with oodles of non-bendable Styrofoam) in which today's ready-made buildings arrive. And I suspect one reason so many of us still have original boxes from vintage PV is the fact that we did dismantle the buildings (usually after New Years) and store them in the same cartons in which they were sold, meaning we were not tempted to discard that cardboard as we would have been if the buildings always stayed in one piece. (See Photo Four.)

No lights? True, but every Plasticville building has a

convenient notch carved out of the bottom of one wall through which you can run a wire from your own light supply. Better still, drill a hole beneath your building (which almost never has a floor) and run your light wire under the



display where visitors can't see it. (See Photo Five.)

Finally, the very simplicity of Plasticville allows for easy modifications, at least to the most common and therefore less valuable pieces.


In past columns I've shown how I could turn a large super market into a movie theater, for instance, or adapt a mobile home trailer into an office for an automobile dealership. More recent buildings tend to be so specifically detailed that it's hard to imagine them as anything other than what they are.

Whatever the reasons, Plasticville still seems to be going strong, more than sixty years since that first terribly oversized white picket fence (see Photo Six) or that significantly undersized brown log cabin saw the light of day. Here's hoping it stays with us well into the twenty-first century.

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
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#### My Other Interests

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#### Help in Identifying Production Year of HU-6 Box An Inquiry by Jon Polinski





I recently came across an empty Plasticville box, House Unit H-6. Unlike all the other Plasticville kits I have, this one does not list the contents on the box. Who would I ask in the club what the contents are suppose to be. All the dividers are there.

(The HU-6 seems to have been offered only in 1950 and 1951 based upon my Plasticville catalogs. The contents were different each year, though.

In 1950 it contained: 5 HP-8 Cape Cods in assorted colors, 4 maple trees, 2 lamp posts, 1 bag of shrubs, and 2 boxes of house fence and gate. My 1950 catalog shows the contents but not the box.

In 1951 it contained: 4 Cape Cods (probably still HP-8's), 4 maple trees, 2 boulevard lights, 1 billboard, 4 telephone poles, 4 street signs, 1 box of house fence. I do not have a 1951 catalog to determine if it was illustrated with the box. Jon's and my collective questions to the members are: Were the illustrations on the 1950 and 1951 boxes different? If the illustrations were different from what year is Jon's box?

If the illustrations were the same, were the inserts different for each year? If the illustration was the same but the inserts different from what year is Jon's box?

Were the 1950 and 1951 boxes of different sizes?



#### Is This a Pre-Production 45973 Sample?

Is the building shown in the photos below a preproduction sample of the 45973 Two Story Switch tower? Is it a sample of the proposed Switch Tower before production molds were made to turn it into a true Plasticville piece?



The 45973 Switch Tower was first catalogued in 1997. It was part of a four item series commemorating the 50th anniversary of Plasticville - we collectors are still intrigued as to why 1997 was chosen as the 50th anniversary year as the earliest know Plasticville dealer catalog is from 1950. The other three pieces in the series were the Rural Two Story House, the Rural Station, and the Pedestrian Bridge.

The colors of this kit very closely match the brown, black, and cream colors of the issued tower. The 45973 tower came with a tan base as well as a tan piece that fits between the walls and the roof. This kit does not seem to have one or the other of these pieces as there is only one tan piece of the needed size. I am uncertain as to whether the provided piece would be placed between the walls and the roof or the bottom of the walls. My feeling is that it is to be used as the base of the building in order to afford a more finished look.





The walls are identical in openings to the issued tower but do not have the tabs that are inserted into the base and roof piece as on the 45973.

The stairs and handrails are three pieces while the stairs and handrails are one piece on the production tower.

It does not seem as if an allowance was made in the design of this piece to include a chimney. There is no hole in the roof nor chimney parts included in the kit. The 45973 does have a two-piece tan chimney. It fits in the peak of its roof.

This building definitely requires gluing. There are none of the patented lugs on any of the walls. This can be seen in the photo of the single wall. This, again, leads me to believe that it may have been an early proposal piece. Why go to the expense of creating a mold for a piece that may be rejected when a representative sample could be produced from a current mold? The walls would probably be the most defining factor in choosing it for production.

There are five short straight pieces on the tan tree for which I cannot determine a use. They do not seem to be of adequate length to be used as downspouts and there are no gutters to which they would be attached.

A more perplexing question is, "What is the use of the two tan triangles?". They seem to not have a use either.

There are a few, what seem to be, mold cavity markings on the pieces. There are no markings to identify the manufacturer. It is with relative certainty that all four of the 50th anniversary pieces were made in Denmark by Heljan. It is my presumption that this kit was molded by them as well.

The building was sent to me as you see it as a gift from a friend at Bachmann in late 2007 or early 2008. Unfortunately no documentation was included as to its pedigree. I also cannot say with certainty that it is complete due to that lack of documentation. I can only surmise. All in all, it is an intriguing piece considering from whom it was received.



#### Greenberg's 2012 Pocket Price Guides

The 2012 editions of Greenberg's Lionel Pocket Price Guide has been available for some time.

There will not be a 2012 American Flyer guide.

There is a 9th edition Marx guide instead. Kalmbach Books has opted to alternate between publishing the American Flyer guide and the Marx guide. This is the year for the Marx guide.

Both the Lionel guide and the Marx guide are in the customary  $4 \times 8 \frac{1}{2}$  format. The Lionel guide is becoming thick enough that even though it is still called a pocket guide it would take a

pocket of some size in which to carry it at just over 350 pages. The Marx guide is 80 pages. I am pleased to see that the Marx guide includes the Marx trains created between 1993 and 2004 by James and Debby Flynn.

As I do not have an American Flyer guide for this year nor a previous Marx guide, I am unable to make a comparison as to value changes this year. My comparison of the prices of the same Lionel pieces as in the past is included.


My unscientific list of Lionel pieces includes prewar, postwar, and modern era up to about 1980. All of the items in the list are power units of some type.

The values in the 2012 guide are definitely a mixed bag. Six out of the ten retained their 2011 values for both good and excellent condition.

Surprisingly, though, both the 2343 A and B units went up approximately 20% in excellent condition but lost a few dollars in Good condition. The A unit went from\$170 to \$167 in good condition and from \$322 to \$463 in excellent condition.

The most surprising change was in the 2360 green GG-1. The good condition value increased by \$11 to \$474 while the excellent value dropped a whopping \$220. I would attribute that drop to leftover effects of the recession but the 700E maintained its excellent value at \$2950.

I feel that, as I have stated in my last two reviews, it may be wise to hold onto your trains until there is again some stability in the values. The Lionel guide is priced at





\$18.95 as was last year's edition. The Marx guide is priced at \$12.95.

#### Help Needed Identifying Street Sign, Follow-UP

The article, *Help Needed in Identifying Street Sign*, by David Allen, appeared on p. 17 of the August, 2011 issue of *The Villager* (Vol. 10, No. 3). In spite of the "light lemon-yellow" color, and the absence of the BB logo on its base, I believe the "WATCH CHILDREN" sign in question may well be a Bachmann Bros. Plasticville product for the

following reason.

sets of boxed and unboxed Plasticville that include street signs (Nos. 12-A, Nos. 1405, and No. ST-1 (unboxed)). All sets with street signs that I have, save one, contain the usual chrome-yellow colored signs, marked on their bases with the BB logo. However, I have one (partial) set of street signs (9 ea. of 12 ea., likely from an unboxed 12-A set), including a "WATCH CHILDREN" sign, that is molded in light lemon-yellow plastic such as is described in David Allen's article. All of the 9 signs in my lemonyellow set, however, have the usual BB logo in the center base declivity. Also, my signs all have black-highlighted lettering and borders (with lettering and borders even more boldly stamped than on any of my chrome-yellow blackstamped signs). So there is no doubt that Bachmann Bros. manufactured lemon-yellow street signs.

I bought this set of light lemon-yellow signs some years ago, probably at a train show, precisely because I thought, at that time, they were of an uncommon color. I have not seen another such lemon yellow Plasticville street sign or sign set since then, although I have certainly been on the lookout for any or all such less-common Plasticville

items.

On the other hand, it could be that, since Mr. Allen's unidentified sign lacks the BB logo on its base, it is a "knockoff" of the Bachmann Bros. item by some unknown manufacturer, possibly Japanese. In this connection, I purchased, at a 2005 train show an assortment of 21 lemon-yellow plastic street signs with black "stamped(?)" lettering and borders. The yellow is of a significantly darker hue than my lemon-yellow Plasticville signs.

These signs appear to be what could be called a "double knockoff"-- the signs have characteristics of <u>both</u> Plasticville street signs and Marx small Rite-O-Way railroad signs. Without going into detail here, I have concluded both, that these signs were likely made in Japan, possibly in the immediate postwar period or in the early 1950s, and that they might also have been sold in sets without the black lettering applied. While Mr. Allen's sign may have been "Made in Japan," it is not from a set such as is described here. My plastic Japanese signs <u>all</u> have square bases, whereas Plasticville street signs, Mr. Allen's sign, and, indeed, Marx Rite-O-Way signs all have round bases.

If Mr. Allen's sign is of Japanese manufacture, it is unlikely that its particular maker will ever be identified, owing to the structure and practices of the Japanese toy industry. However, if Mr. Allen's sign was "Made in U.S.A.," and if it can be established that it is <u>not</u> a Plasticville item, then there is still hope that its manufacturer will eventually become known.


#### **Product Reviews**



Hand-made pine trees by Dechant's Railroad Express. While browsing on eBay a while back, I happened across a seller by the name of railroaderal who was offering a selection of hand-made pine trees at what seemed to be an extremely reasonable price. When I say, "extremely reasonable price", I mean right around a buck apiece when purchased as a Buy It Now for \$32.99 for a lot of 35 trees. The lot, and it can still be found on eBay, consisted of 10 pieces each of 2, 3, and 5 inch trees and 5 pieces of 7 inch trees.

I contacted the seller as the trees looked much better than one would expect for their average price. Much to my surprise, the seller not only sold on eBay but also has a very nicely presented website at http://www.mrtrain.com.

As I was curious as to the quality of the trees, I asked the seller for a sample. Instead of one tree, the seller sent



**Caboose**, Brian Solomon, published by Quayside Press, 192 pages, softcover, 6 1/2 X 8 1/4 format, \$19.99 US, \$21.99 Canada.

This title is part of Quayside Press' Gallery Series of books. Other titles in the series include Steam Power, Rail Power, Railroad Rolling Stock, and the previously reviewed Vintage Diesel Power.

There are four chapters in the book. The chapter titles are: Classic, Bay-Window, Wide Vision and "Odds and Ends". Also included are an acknowledgement, an introduction, and an index. The index is a nice addition as it includes the names of the various railroad museums and societies mentioned throughout the book. This will make it easy for me to research museums that may be in an area that I may be visiting.

Each chapter contains black and white and color photos of the various cabooses. Each photo is captioned with a description of the caboose as well as additional information regarding the construction or history of the manufacturer or the line owning that particular unit. The photo captions me one each of their 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, and 7 inch trees.

The trunks of the trees are a double strand of twisted wire. All have approximately a half inch of wire at their base for insertion into your layout. That half inch is extra as all the trees measure almost exactly their advertised size from their top to the lowest branches. The branches on every one are extremely thick. They are nicely proportioned and with a nice darker green color. I found the trees to be quite realistic.

If you are working on a layout and require pine trees you may want to consider these from mrTRAIN. They may be just what you need. I would not hesitate to put them on my next layout.

The pine trees can be purchased on eBay through the seller name, railroaderal, or purchased directly from the seller's website at http://www.mrtrain.com. The website offers a buyer the option to create a customized package of trees at \$1.25 each.


throughout the book are excellent. Each photo also lists the photographer or the collection in which it resides.

It was difficult for me to decide whether I liked the Classic or the "Odds and Ends" chapter better. The Classics chapter runs over 60 pages while the "Odds and Ends" chapter runs nearly 30 pages in length. Both are excellent but the early 1900's black and white photos of the four wheel (bobber) cabooses in the "Odds and Ends" chapter swayed me to towards that chapter.

I enjoyed reading this book and recommend it if you enjoy a good photo review of cabooses. I know that I did.

**Basic Structure Modeling for Model Railroaders**, The Complete Photo Guide, Jeff Wilson, published by Model Railroader Books, a division of Kalmbach Books, 88 pages, softcover, 8 <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> X 11 format, \$19.95.

A recent electronic edition of Classic Toy Trains listed six "basics" books as a package .deal. I have been

fortunate to be able to review three of the six books. This is the last review of three of those six books in Kalmbach's "Basics" books series. It is hoped that I will have the opportunity to review the remaining three at a future date.

Reviews of the *Basic Scenery for Model Railroaders* and *Basic Structure Modeling* books in this series are in the August and November, 2011, editions of the newsletter, respectively.

This book was published in 2005 yet the information in it is as relevant today as it was back then. As with the other books, this book is written by an HO modeler, yet his techniques and ideas apply to any scale.

Chapters one and two discuss how to more accurately assemble plastic and wood structures. One of the gluing suggestions for plastic structures was to clamp the sides together and then add liquid glue to the hidden side of the joint with a paintbrush and allow capillary action pull the glue into the joint. He also suggests reinforcing building corners with a small piece of square strip styrene. There are also two full pages at the end of the chapter. One discusses basic tools for building any type of structure while the other lists the various types of adhesives. Chapter three deals with kitbashing and takes the reader through the creation of a switch tower of which the prototype is in Portage, Illinois. The structure is made of styrene in this demonstration.

Most of us would think of the doors, windows, and face trims on a building when considering enhancing a model. Why not the roof? Many times the roofs of buildings on a layout are quite visible as well. Chapter four shows how to use leftover sprues as piping on a roof as well as how to create gravel, rolled roofing, shake shingle, and metal roofs.

The remaining three chapters discuss painting, detailing (adding people and small items), and signs (both street and building signs). The painting section has a full page dedicated to various paints as well as a full page on paintbrushes. A sidebar in the detailing section illustrates how to turn a small block if wood and brown paper similar to a grocery bag into a cardboard box. Have you ever thought of using part of a stir stick for a sign? That is just one suggestion chapter seven.

The remainder of the book contains four pages of photos to give you inspiration as well as a three page list of manufacturers referenced in the book.

As with the two previous books, I feel it is a bargain as the information, especially the list of manufacturers makes it a handy reference.

Lionel Nation 7, DVD, 60-plus minutes, TM Books & Video, \$19.99. Just how large is the "Lionel Nation? Well, as the name implies, this is the seventh offering in the series with an announcement of Lionel Nation 8 at the conclusion of this edition. The format is the same as the previous editions. Although the package states 60-plus minutes, my DVD player displayed a time

of over 70 minutes. I believe that makes this the longest DVD in this series.

As with the other editions, there is an introduction that gives the viewer an overview of the contents disc. There are total of eight chapters if a short, narrative free, demonstration of the Vision Line 700E is considered a chapter.

The first chapter is probably the one that would be of greatest interest to older Lionel people as it describes how the last Lionel layout was moved from the visitor's center in Michigan to Railroad Museum of Long Island where it is preserved as an operating layout. It was interesting to find that the funds to bring the layout Long Island and put it back together were raised by selling special edition freight cars based upon businesses local to the museum including Entenmann's, who is well known for their donuts and other pastries.

The Alaska railroad section will clue you in to how many various Alaska railroad pieces there are in the blue and yellow color scheme. There's enough to make a nice length train using engines and rolling stock of only those two colors.

If you are interested in various postwar operating cars then that section as well as a section on how to use postwar parts in MPC era engines is a must. I always like viewing these videos a second time. The first time is to hear what the modelers have to say about their layouts. The second time is to be more observant of the layouts. I observed things I missed on the first viewing on the two additional layouts highlighted included on this DVD when I took a second look.

Jim Suhling has a novel approach to creating a water effect. He used medium blue fish tank gravel to simulate water. His layout if a single level and that seems to have worked out well. He mentioned that for the ground cover he used very short pile Berber carpet in a light tan with brown specks and drawer liner for roadways.

Doug Spitler's layout is not complete as I saw in some scenes the ubiquitous pink styrofoam and he has been working on the layout since 1997. Maybe he is just changing it a bit instead of it not being completed.

There is also a chapter on the Heritage Series of Lionel engines. The narrator gives a brief history of each of the four engines while they are shown operating. Be sure to catch the fate of the passengers riding outside on the coaches.

I have enjoyed viewing every one of these DVDs as they seem to just get better and better.
